CRITICAL LINKS + BLACK BOOK RESEARCH + WRITTEN ANALYSIS

As part of your A level you must demonstrate your ability to analyse and research the work of artists and designers.

You already have some evidence of this within your projects such as your Critical Links.

However you must also have evidence of written analysis and this is what we will focus on over the next 2 weeks.

ANALYSIS

Here are the four main focus points for analysing the work of artists, craftspeople and designers. Some of the questions you may ask yourself about the work . . .

FORM

How has the work been arranged? Is this in keeping with its content? Is it subtle or vivid? Etc

CONTENT / CONTEXT

What is the subject matter of this work, what is it about? Is the subject matter incidental or of importance?

PROCESS

How was the work made and what was it made with? What materials, tools, processes and techniques did the artist use?

MOOD

Does the work affect me, the viewer, in any way? Does it capture or convey a mood, atmosphere or emotion which I have previously experienced?

DON'T MISTAKE LEGIBILITY FOR COMMUNICATION"

DAVID CARSON

Throughout the history of design, there has been an aesthetic battle between designers who believe design should be clean, clear and readable, such as Jan Tschichold and those who believe it should be more much more expressive, such as David Carson, the pioneer of 'grunge' design.

We would like you to investigate this quote, looking at both designers who agree or disagree with this statement.

MODERNISM.

In order to truly understand the complexities of this statement you must first
look back at one of the most important art and design movements

FUNCTION SHOULD ALWAYS DICTATE FORM

This was the underlying idea of the Modernist movement, research this further.

JAN TSCHICHOLD

This is arguably one of the most important design books of all time, written by Tschichold it set out a set of rules that 'COULD / SHOULD' be applied to all areas of typography . . . [research this further](#)

POSTMODERNISM

This elusive design style is notoriously difficult to define, Postmodernism was a drastic departure from the utopian visions of Modernism, which had been based on clarity and simplicity. The Modernists wanted to open a window onto a new world; Postmodernism's key principles were complexity and contradiction. If Modernist objects suggested utopia, progress and machine-like perfection, then the Postmodern object seemed to come from a dystopian and far-from-perfect future.

David Carson, Wolfgang Weingart and Neville Brody's work can be considered Postmodern. Please research this further

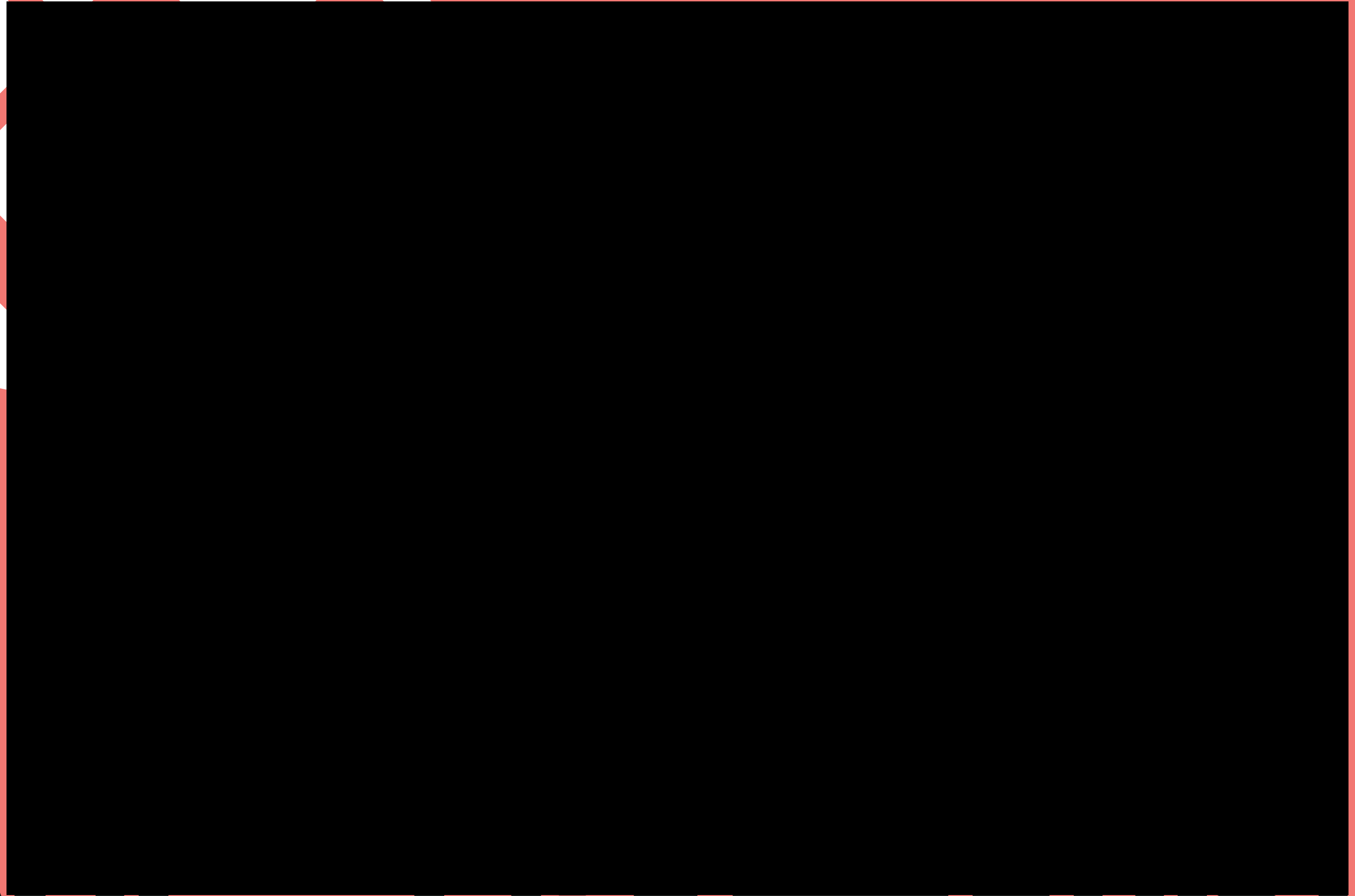
